

## Call for Papers NOITS Annual Workshop 2007

on

## International Economics

Stockholm University
Stockholm, May 18-20, 2007

The tenth NOITS workshop will be held in Stockholm, 18-20 May 2001. The workshop will be hosted by the Department of Economics, Stockholm University, and will be organised by *Karolina Ekholm*, Stockholm University; *Rikard Forslid*, Stockholm University; *Pertti Haaparanta*, Helsinki School of Economics; *Karen Helene Ulltveit-Moe*, Oslo University, and *Pascalis Raimondos-Møller*, Copenhagen Business School.

The non-Nordic speakers for this year will be *Pol Antràs*, Harvard University, and *John Romalis*, Chicago Business School.

The number of participants will be restricted to approximately 40. Accommodation will be paid for by the local organisers. Doctoral students submitting papers are encouraged to seek travel grants from the Nordic Network in Economics (see their homepage at <a href="https://www.hecer.fi/NNE/">www.hecer.fi/NNE/</a>). Travel expenses will be reimbursed by the local organisers to the extent funding permits. The Nordic International Trade Seminars (NOITS) was established in Stockholm, March 1998, at the network's first annual workshop. NOITS aims to organise annual workshops with presentations by Nordic researchers and graduate students specialising in international economics. In addition a few non-Nordic researchers with a considerable international reputation will be invited. The network serves several purposes. First, it facilitates collaborative research and scientific contacts among Nordic researchers. Second, it offers graduate students and junior researchers an opportunity to present their work, and thereby get valuable feedback, as well as to prepare for international workshops and conferences. Third, it is hoped to strengthen the ties between the Nordic academic institutions.
